We have completed yet another year for the Lambton Federation of Agriculture and this year have been just as busy as the last year. The following is a brief summary of some of the projects and activities that your directors have been working on over the past year.

- Financial seminar with BDO and OMAFRA.

 Development of LFA Mission/Vision Statement as follows: LFA is to be an Advocate for Agricultural Producers through Networking, Education and Communications with Community and Governments.

Development of a Personal Conduct Policy which was adapted from the OFA convention workbook with OFA permission.

- We now have Director Handbooks for each director. These three ring binders hold pertinent information that each director needs.
- There are now new guidelines for our 4-H awards. Also, there are now 3 awards of \$250, \$175 and \$100 with no categories and the club secretary book to be completed within that year. There was much improvement in the secretary books for this year with all awards issued.
- Director training took the form of a three part series covering Media Relations, Making and presenting reports, chairing meetings and idea building.
- LFA offered financial support for the following:

 - Sarnia-Lambton Council for Economic Renewal
- Directors helped with the OFA booth during the London Farm Show.
- Our newsletter was published in the Voice of the Lambton Farmer this year. Let us hear your comments on this.
- Scholarships were awarded. Now is the time to get your applications in. Deadline January 15th, 1999.
- Lambton's Agricultural Tour in September was a very successful event.
- The phone blitz to remind all farmers of the need to have a farm registration number was very well done with membership numbers up.
- Thanks to our past President Robert Johnston, we had a display at Envirofest in Samia.
- We welcome our new M.S.R. Maria Van Bommel in March.
- A subcommittee of our Waste Management Committee, chaired by Don Stewardson is monitoring the Warwick Landfill expansion.
- LFA was asked for support regarding East Sombra School closing. Subsequently Dan Caron, our Regional Director for Lambton South West now sets on the OFA Rural Affairs committee regarding Rural School closure. Congratulations Dan.
- Our Waste Management Committee, chaired by Dave Smith, has started working with the County on a Nutrient Management Program. Watch for details of upcoming meetings and your chance to voice your concerns about this very important and sensitive issue.
- Plans are underway to move forward with an Economic Study of the impact that agriculture have on life in Lambton County.

I have spent as much of my available time exploring the different parts of the county as well as getting to know the membership.

My first nine months on the job has been busy with issues including Nutrient Management by-laws; the Gas, Oil and Salt Resources Act, and Farmland classification for property assessment.

I also attended a meeting of the City of Sarnia's municipal council with Dan Young and the Enviro-fest at the Sarnia waterfront among other events.

Thanks to the energy of your township directors we were able to increase the membership to OFA within Lambton to a total of 2134 Farm Family Members.

I look forward to an exciting year with Lambton Federation of Agriculture and ask that you please call me at any time if you have any concerns or questions.

CONSUMER RELATIONS AND AGRI-FOOD AWARENESS COMMITTEE - JOHN YOUNG, CHAIRMAN

The main activity of the Consumer Relations and Agri-food Awareness Committee is the organization of the annual Bluewater Farm Hiker Tour. It is an opportunity for families to come out and visit modem agricultural operations and learn about food production. Our target audience is urban, but rural people are always welcome.

Planning for the farm tour started in March with an appreciation dinner for the host farmers from the 1997 tour. It was also an opportunity to talk about the experience and get ideas for future tours.

In July we approached six farms in the Forest/Arkona area. All of the potential hosts were enthusiastic about participating. Two committee meetings were held to discuss promotions and to plan a passport.

On a sunny September 13th, LFA volunteers handed out passports at the Lambton Mall and the Forest Knechtel store. Host farm families and other helpers from commodity groups devoted their day to explaining about food production. When the day was over, about 300 people had learned a little more about agriculture and country life. Evaluation forms handed in provided a lot of positive feedback and suggestions for the future.

This even would not have been a success without the cooperation of the farm families involved. We were very lucky to have the excellent farms owned by the Soetemans, Caris, VanKessel, VanEngelen, Vandenberg and McKenzie families to visit. Special thanks should also be given to the other members of the committee, Randy Molzan, and Janet Loosemore who worked very hard to make this day a success.

LAMBTON JUNIOR FARMERS REPORT: STEVE R. WILKINSON, AGRICULTURE REPRESENTATIVE

The Lambton County Junior Farmers is composted of thirty members ranging in age from 15 to 29. The club is run entirely by the members, who improve their leadership and communication skills by organizing meetings and running food booths. We also work at aiding the community by road clean-ups, donations to both local and provincial charities. Our members have the chance to meet other Junior Farmers from across Ontario by taking part in provincial sporting events and culture activities. This year Lambton hosted the provincial event, Culturama in April at Forest. Members also have the opportunity to host International Young Farmers from around the world.

Next year Lambton Junior Farmers will celebrate fifty years. Keep your eyes and ears open for more information.

It has been a very busy year for County Council and an interesting one for myself as the LFA representative to County Council. There have been many issues that have affected the rural community that have been discussed at County Council and at committee meetings.

The whole discussion of the rights and privileges of Samia and the rest of the county was discussed at length by a committee headed by Joe Dedecker, County Warden and Mike Bradley, Mayor of Samia. It had been several years since the City and the County had come together and the City asked for dialogue on changes to the current arrangement. After much debate the County Council voted in favour of a new arrangement and more changes may be coming. For more information on these changes contact Ron VanHorne, Clerk of the County.

The official plans of the Townships are currently being discussed as the County Official Plan has been completed. Of interest to many landowners will be the severance issues. While the County opposes retirement severance's and discourages surplus lot severance's, the local municipalities are not always of the same opinion. It is in your best interest as a landowner and if livestock production is part of the scenario, to get involved in the whole severance dialogue. 1999 is the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the founding of Lambton County. As the LFA representative on the committee I urge you to get involved. There is a special quilt that could have your name on it that will be raffled in 1999. There will be historical tours, gala balls and a special cornerstone ceremony, all top celebrate our sesqui-centennial in the county. Many of you will probably want to get involved in this fun and worthwhile anniversary. Carolyn Jamieson is the chair of this committee at the County level.

The LFA, CFFO and the County are currently discussing how to proceed with Nutrient Management in the County. WASTE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE - DAVID W. SMITH, CHAIRMAN

The Waste Management Committee met with a number of Municipal Councilors and/or Councils during the year. We have been discussing Nutrient Management and the possibility of drafting by-laws. President Janet Mater, Earl Morwood and myself met with the County Planning and Works Committee on the same issue.

We are dealing with this issue on the basis as to how we can best serve the farm community and not stifle growth within this same community. At any time if you would like to give your input to his committee feel free to do so.

1998 has been a busy year for pipeline meetings with the proposed pipeline from Dawn Compressor Station to Lake Erie which was to be constructed in 1999, now to be constructed in year 2000. On May 20, 1998 a meeting at Dawn School for a proposed pipeline in Dawn to connect two Bentpath Area Storage Pools to Union Gas existing facilities. On May 28, 1998 a meeting at Courtright Community Hall for a proposed 42 inch diameter pipeline from St. Clair River to Union Gas Dawn Compressor Station by Vector Pipeline Limited who have applied to National Energy Board for approval to construct with hearings in January 1999.

On June 24th, 1998 a meeting at Wilkesport Community Centre for proposed pipeline from Tecumseh Wilkesport transmission pipeline to Coveny Pool by Consumer Gas Co. in Sombra Township. On July 27, 1998 received notice that Union Gas applied to Ontario Energy Board to build a 48 inch diameter pipeline between Dawn Compressor Station to Enniskillen valve sight on Trafalgar line. In prefiled evidence they say they will likely have to expropriate (which is a license to steal) the landowners that have not signed. Union Gas is being asked to put a paragraph in the Transfer Deed that they and their successor be responsible for removal and environmental clean up of these pipelines when they are abandoned. To date they have not given us the paragraph.

On Friday, September 4th, 1998 The Observer the Interprovincial Pipeline Inc. (IPL) states it is going to start transporting unleaded gasoline, diesel fuel, stove oil, furnace oil and aviation fuel through line 8. With reactivation they are asking landowners to be on the look out for leaks along the line. What are landowners being compensated for doing this? In the Petrolia Topic October 4th, 1998 Union Gas is proposing to build a pipeline from the proposed Oil City Natural Gas Storage Pool to the Oil City East Compressor Station.

October 17th, 1998 a notice in The Observer of a proposed pipeline by Tristate Pipeline sponsored by West Coast Energy Inc. of Vancouver B.C. and C.M.S. Gas Transmission and Storage of Dearborn Michigan to go from southwest of Sombra to Union Gas Bickford Compressor Station. There is rumours of a pipeline to be abandoned in North Lambton, also a Oil Line in that area that they want the pressure increased on that is over thirty years old. The following is a example of questions that have been asked by the Lambton Federation of Agriculture on behalf of Landowners and Food producers.

- How will landowners and food producers benefit from this pipeline?
- What Liabilities are placed on landowners by this pipeline?
- 3. What are the physical and financial risks placed on food producers by pipelines?
- 4. What will the thickness of pipe be in the rural area compared to urban area?
- 5. What pressure will this pipeline be operated at?
- 6. Who will be responsible for removal and environmental cleanup of this line when it is abandoned?
- 7. What will this pipeline through farms do to credit rating of the food producers and their families or successors?
- 8. How will this pipeline affect the total annual revenue of food producers?
- 9. Will food producers have to take the loss of production and devaluation of their farms without compensation as they have in the past?
- 10. How reliable is Cathodic Protection? Does it slow up corrosion in one spot and speed it up in another?
- 11. Will there be a paragraph in Transfer Deed that the Pipeline Company of their successors is responsible for removal and environmental cleanup of this pipeline when it is abandoned?
- 12. Will there be bonds posted to cover the cost of abandonment of this pipeline?
- 13. In prefiled evidence, it states Union Gas is a wholly owned subsidiary of West Coast Energy. Who is accountable for Union Gas actions?
- 14. It states in prefiled evidence that Union Gas does not have to abide by any of the bylaws of our municipality. Whey can they devastate our land, landscape and forest and build whatever they want when people born and raised here have to live by the laws?
- 15. Farming is a business not just a way of life. What other business is forced into letting you enter their place of business, shut down a sector of their business for an indefinite period and when you leave, that sector of their business is never as profitable again?
